At the first PNO a little boy came for the first time, at dinner he looked at me with what seemed like fear and puzzlement and said,

"Where are we going to sleep? Where are my pis?" He didn't understand that his foster mom and dad were going to come pick him back up in just a little while. His fearful question was posed with such calmness I couldn't help but wonder how each new change and place he goes must really make him question everything about how he sees life. It broke my heart. He seemed visible relieved when I explained he wasn't sleeping at camp and his foster mom and dad would come soon

The last time he came to PNO he approached me and said, "First we are going to play, then we will go outside, then we I've been working in our baby/toddler will eat pizza, then my mom and dad will

come back for me." I confirmed that this is exactly what would take place and took delight at seeing him relax and come further out of his shell in our predictable and trustworthy environment. He also came to me, the person he knew had been there before to confirm his beliefs about what would happen... relationship builds security, security builds opportunity to share what we know matters most in this life, a relationship with Jesus and the hope we find in the Gospel.

At the core of Cross Bar X's mission is an unflinching commitment to seeing all the youth we serve as bearers of the image of God! Alongside that is an unashamed adherence that the Gospel of Jesus is the solution for all people and all the problems

Exciting Times Ahead for CBX As It Looks To the Future!

The last number of years we have been evaluating future ministry direction for CBX. We have been happy with our summer camps and camper outreach ministry, but have felt a nagging burden that there is something God wanted of CBX.

In 2017, the Board of CBX charged the full time team with assessing what this might be. As we began our evaluation, one thing quickly emerged as an area that needed to be addressed. CBX's camper statistics revealed that we were off target with the demographic of kids attending camp. What we learned was that there were many campers coming from churched homes, economically stable situations, and health family situations. This number was creeping towards 40% of the CBX campers in 2017.

We weren't completely caught off guard by this data. With the COLS program increasing awareness of CBX, several regional camps closing, and gentrification in many of the urban areas CBX previously recruited campers from, we had an inclination that things were changing for CBX. Upon a deeper investigation however, we truly realized we needed to evaluate how to best fullfil the mission to reach socially and economically disadvantaged youth.

This past year, we have looked at different population of kids in America that are in

need. Once we identified these populations, we looked at how CBX could minister effectively to each of these populations. What we found was that there was a deep need for support work with foster children and within the foster care system and that this population was being under-served.

We have worked with this population of children for years at CBX. I would say that any given year, 10-15% of the kids CBX has worked with are foster children. However in identifying the deep needs within this population of youth, CBX has an amazing opportunity to make an impact! In 2018, we are already taking some strides in this direction. This past summer, camp was 100% free to all foster children. We have also begun a monthly respite program for foster parents, and our camper follow-up coordinators are actively working with several local foster kids

What other impact can we make? That guestion is the task ahead for us in 2019. In the first guarter of 2019, the board of CBX will be sitting down and beginning the process of setting a vision for what this work will look like in the years to come. We share this with you now so that you can begin to pray with us through this process. Will you commit to lifting our board up in prayer during this time? We thank you for your support of CBX and being a part of this ministry!

With the improved financial situation of CBX the last couple years, we have been able to address many of the much needed repairs and improvements to CBX. We have committed to these infrastructure items as opposed to major additions/improvements at CBX, because we want the core of camp to be strong for many years to come.

This Summer/Fall, we were blessed to have the Texas Baptist Men come to build us this wonderful shower house down at the ropes course. After the men framed and sheet rocked the building, Bob Baker spent a month with us finishing the tile and plumbing work. This is a really wonderful addition to CBX that will allow for increased usage of our lake, ropes course, and west side of the property.

In addition, we have been able to run utilities and a new road to the ropes course. This allows for vehicle and emergency



access to the beach front, ropes course, and archery range and potable water/electricity at these locations.

- Upgraded 12 and 15 passenger vans


